

Our 110-Year-Old State-of-the-Art Funding Model



I constantly marvel at the myriad schemes that charities use to raise money. There are t-shirts and calendars and return address stickers and branded doo-dads of every description. Often TV ads, direct mail campaigns, and email solicitations chew up incredible portions of the funds they actually produce.

In contrast, our fund-raising approach at the Blind Relief Fund is remarkably and wonderfully simple, and it hasn't changed much in over a century. Let me explain. The Blind Relief Fund is organized in such a way that all our operating expenses – our office facilities, our supplies, the phone bill, and basic staff salaries – are covered by our endowment. While this forces us to operate frugally in a climate of ever-increasing costs, it sends an important message to our supporters.

Every single penny that's contributed to the Blind Relief Fund goes directly to the people in need.

When you contribute money to the Blind Relief Fund, your money goes directly to people like Diane and David and Mary and Charles, whose stories are told in this report.

Their need is beyond dispute. The tragic truth is that the blind in Philadelphia endure lives of unspeakable hardship, poverty, crime and neglect that are beyond the comprehension of many of our donors. Your dollars provide a financial spark that elicits self-reliance, dignity and independence.

We are unlike any other social service organization serving the blind in Philadelphia, in that we accept no public funds. We are not constrained by bureaucracy and its often contradictory rules and regulations. In fact, public-funded agencies often come to us when snarls of red tape prevent the urgent actions needed to save families and lives.

In the pages that follow, we detail the actual cost of the services we provide to our family of clients. I encourage you to consider their needs with an open heart and to give generously.

I will also make a promise. For every dollar you contribute for whatever purpose, we will tell you exactly how that money was spent, while of course respecting our clients' privacy.

Our 110-year-old funding model is unique and highly effective.

100% of our clients are eligible to receive furniture and appliances.

30% of our clients received furniture and/or appliances in 2014.

Diane D. is 59 years old and has low partial vision. Diane has been a client since 1993. She currently lives on \$803 per month, which covers her rent and utilities with a little money left over for food and other expenses. She lives alone and receives no family support. We helped Diane by replacing her bed due to a recent bed bug infestation.

Approximately half of our clients are on the waiting list or in search of PHA (city) subsidized housing.

HUD (federal) subsidized housing has a 3-5 year waiting list.

29% of our clients received assistance with housing expenses in 2014.

David B. is 57 years old and has high partial vision. David has been a client since 2007. David lives alone and receives some financial support from his family. We assist David with his current housing costs while he is on a subsidized housing list and seeking a roommate.

Visual Assistance includes reading mail, preparing bill payments, filling out certification forms for medical, social security, housing, paratransit and utilities (LIHEAP), and telephone advocacy to handle and resolve disputes or answer questions.

Professional Visits update current client information and re-assess needs.

New Client Intake Visits gather information and assess a new client's needs and family support.

453 clients were paid a Visual Assistance Visit, Professional Visit or New Client Intake Visit in 2014.

Mary R. is 88 years old and has low partial vision. She has been a client since 1999. Mary is widowed and lives alone on an income of \$916 per month. We assist Mary with handling her paperwork monthly.




Utility bills include gas, oil, electric, and water.

We provide up to 100 gallons of oil per year to our eligible clients; each client will use 400+ gallons during winter months.

74% of our clients are eligible for assistance with utility bills.

46% of our clients received assistance with utility bills in 2014, averaging \$288/client.

Anslem C. is 57 years old and has high partial vision. He has been a client since 1992. Anslem currently lives alone on \$610 per month. We assist Anslem with the large utility bills for electric, gas and oil that are beyond his means.

74% of our clients are eligible for food coupons.


38% of clients received food coupons in 2014.

Tyrina M. is 32 years old and is totally blind. She also battles multiple sclerosis. She has been our client since 2001. Tyrina is a single mom raising three sons under the age of 10 on \$697 per month from SSI and \$538 per month in food stamps. In addition to other assistance, we provide Tyrina with Food Coupons three times per year.



Each year we treat our clients to a Holiday Luncheon and Dance. In a typical year 200 clients attend at a total cost of approximately \$5,800.

Charles M. is 57 years old and is totally blind. He has been a client since 2003. Charles lives on \$720 per month to meet his \$816 monthly expenses. Charles has attended our Holiday Luncheon and Dance for eleven years in a row.




54 clients received visual aids in 2014.

Our History

The Blind Relief Fund of Philadelphia traces its origins to 1905, when Isabel Kennedy began working with The Pennsylvania Home Teaching Society and Free Circulating Library for the Blind. Her work took her into the homes of blind Philadelphians, where she learned of their struggle for the basic necessities of life.

Although there were agencies devoted to educating the blind, Mrs. Kennedy was unable to locate any organization engaged in assisting the impoverished blind for basic human needs.

In 1909, with a \$50 gift from a friend, Mrs. Kennedy founded The Blind Relief Fund of Philadelphia. During that first winter, the Fund distributed coal, groceries, clothing, and small amounts of money to 75 needy blind persons. Out of concern for their social and emotional needs, Mrs. Kennedy organized various recreational activities and social outings. In 1920, Mrs. Kennedy was able to establish an investment account after receiving an anonymous gift of \$10,000 in securities. At this time Mrs. Kennedy articulated her vision that The Blind Relief Fund be a privately funded organization and not become dependent upon funding from government or public agencies. This position enables


The Blind Relief Fund to side step the bureaucracy and red tape that often impedes an agency's ability to immediately respond to the needs of its clients.

Mrs. Kennedy established The Blind Relief Fund's longstanding policy of coordinating all services through home visitations by an experienced case manager.

In 1952, Frank W. Harris, Jr., who had volunteered accounting and legal services for 22 years, took the reins of leadership. His financial skills had guided The Blind Relief Fund through the Great Depression, World War II, and the Korean War – all extremely difficult times for charitable organizations. Nelson G. Harris succeeded his father, Frank Harris, as President of The Blind Relief Fund in 1968 and served in that capacity for 32 years. Nelson Harris, also a lawyer and a Certified Public Accountant, continued to provide the astute fiscal leadership to preserve Mrs. Kennedy's dream.

Today, the President of The Blind Relief Fund of Philadelphia is Stephen J. Harris, who has been an active member of the Board of Managers for 33 years and represents the third generation of the Harris family to serve in this capacity. Under his guidance, the Fund works closely with other agencies to intervene on behalf of blind clients whose health or safety is threatened.

The Blind Relief Fund has, over the years, developed a deeper awareness of the interconnection between financial, emotional, and social issues that confront blind adults. Resolving this tangle of problems and bringing hope and comfort to perhaps the most disadvantaged of Philadelphia's citizens remains our solemn moral obligation.
